School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2012-13)

Mission Statement

"Dan O. Root II Elementary School will ensure that every student has successful experiences promoting intellectual, emotional, and social development. The Dan O. Root II school community will demonstrate mutual respect in a positive and safe atmosphere, as we work toward improving student achievement."

About our School

Dan O. Root II Elementary School is located in east Suisun City, California. Dan O. Root II opened its doors to 1060 K-6 students on July 9, 1990. The school opened as a year round school following a 60 - 20 calendar. August 2010 we began the year as a K-5th grade school following a traditional district wide calendar.

Parents are actively involved at the school through the PTO, School Site Council, and by volunteering in the classrooms.

It should be noted that Dan O. Root II Elementary School has received the California Distinguished School Award three times in 1998, 2004, and 2008.

School Profile

Dan O. Root II School projection for the 2013-2014 school year is approximately 600 students in grades K-5. Classes in grade levels kindergarten through third grade house a maximum of 32 students each, and fourth through fifth grade house a maximum of 34 students each. Dan O. Root II School has 19 regular education teachers, 4 Special Education teachers (2 of which belong to the county SDC program), and 1 Resource Specialist. Dan O. Root II teachers are fully credentialed, Highly Qualified and EL Authorized. 60.7% of Dan O. Root II students qualify for free or reduced lunch. Dan O. Root II currently services 75 English Language Learners. Fourteen students are in our two Kindergarten special day classes. Thirteen students are involved in the county special education program at our site.

Kindergarten students receive 200 minutes of instruction daily. Grades 1 through 5 receive a total of 320 minutes of instruction 5 days per week and 230 minutes of instruction is provided on minimum days. Nine minimum days are scheduled for the school year. Dan O. Root II has a collaborative and consultation service model for students on Individual Education Programs (IEP) receiving Resource Specialist services. The school psychologist is present two days a week; the school nurse is present one day a week; a health clerk is on campus for 8 hours one day a week; and a Language, Speech and Hearing specialist is on site daily. All students have equal access to computers in our computer lab. Our library is staffed with a Library Media Technician.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2012-13)

The Dan O. Root II staff believes that the involvement with and support of students by their parents is a key factor in student success, thus communication with our parents is a collective goal for our school. The Roadrunner Review, our school's monthly parent bulletin, contains information for parents with regards to activities, meetings, and school events, and ways to support their children in meeting the challenges of today's education. Teachers also send monthly newsletters detailing in-class activities. At the front of the school is a sign that is used to signal important information to our community. A phone message and e-mail from the principal is sent home every Sunday with weekly news and updates for parents and students. We encourage parent involvement through district-level communication committees, school site parent-teacher groups, in-school volunteer programs and monthly "Coffee with the Principal" gatherings. Teachers are encouraged to hold "Get Acquainted Conferences" at the beginning of the year. Two-way communication is important to ensure student success. All grade levels implement the Thursday Folder system to provide communication. Students (4th-5th) utilize the agenda/planner, which allows parents and teachers to communicate daily. Parents may contact teachers via email at anytime. Parental involvement is highly encouraged and parents are welcome to volunteer in classrooms, with PTO, School Site Council, and English Language Advisory Committee. In our school, parents serve as noon supervisors, classroom and library helpers, and school advisory committee members. They also serve on fundraising committees (PTO) to assist in the purchase of materials and equipment, facility improvements, and transportation services for field trips and enrichment events.

Special parent programs include Parent & Teacher Organization (PTO); Family Movie Nights, Ice Cream Socials, Carnivals, Book Fairs, Multicultural celebrations, and Bully Prevention. We strive to offer a continuum of opportunities for our parents to support their children. Conference times that accommodate parents are a goal as well.

III. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- California Standards Tests (CSTs), which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- California Modified Assessment (CMA), an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2012-13)

The Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District requires safety plans for each school: BP/AR 0450, Comprehensive Safety Plan; BP 3515, School Safety and Security; AR 3515.5, Safety Program; BP/AR 3515.2 Disruptions; BP/AR 3515.6, Campus Security; and BP/AR 3516, Disaster Regulations.

The Governing Board insists that students and staff have the right to a safe and secure campus where they are free from physical and psychological harm. The Board is fully committed to maximizing school safety and to creating a positive learning environment that teaches violence prevention and emphasizes high expectations for student achievement, responsible behavior, and respect for others.

Each school site develops a comprehensive school wide safety plan that includes violence prevention strategies and actions to be taken in the event of a crisis. Each plan is tailored to the specific conditions at the school. Each school plan takes into account the expertise, available resources and building design, along with factors unique to that site. A copy of each school's plan is available at the school and in the office of the Directors of Elementary and Secondary Education. The plan is reviewed at the beginning of each year by the principal with his/her complete faculty. Each school site annually updates the plans.

The School Safety Plan at Dan O. Root II was last revised in August, 2012 and was reviewed with staff in August, 2012. The local Police Department and SITE Council Membership also reviewed the plan.

The key elements included in the plan include the types of alarms to be used in various emergency situations and the staff training procedures.

- * A positive school climate promoting respect for diversity, personal and social responsibility, effective interpersonal and communication skills, anger management and conflict resolution.
- *Disciplinary policies and procedures.
- *Prevention of and alternatives to violence.

- *Assessment of the school's physical environment and development of ground security.
- *School-site crisis intervention strategies.
- *Staff training in violence prevention and intervention techniques.

VI. School Facilities

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (School Year 2013-14)

Dan O. Root Elementary is located on Harrier Drive, in the City of Suisun.

General

The District takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the District uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are available on this site. Below is more specific information on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure the students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment.

Age of School Buildings

This facility was built in 1990 and consists of 35 classrooms, a library-media center wired for technology, support offices, a computer lab, restrooms, and a multi-purpose room with a kitchen. The campus includes a playground with equipment and field area for recreation. All the classrooms are wired for data/internet access giving students maximum opportunities for learning.

Maintenance and Repair

District maintenance staff ensures that repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Cleaning Process and Schedule

The District governing board has adopted Strategic Goals, which include cleaning standards for all schools in the District. (Strategic Goal #4). These standards are available at any school site and the District Office. The District's Operations Department works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school, along with the supervision of the site principal.

Deferred Maintenance Budget

The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair/replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems.
